Cambodia

Last week ten of our fantastic students set off on the adventure of a life time to Cambodia with Camps international. The expedition is based on helping 3rd world countries work towards completing the UN SDGs. The team arrived in Cambodia and stayed in Camp Beng Mealea for four nights where they made over 700 concrete tiles from scratch to lay in a local school to make a playground for the children. They made a water pot for a local family to collect water in the dry season. The students got to interact with the students by teaching them some English lessons and had some fun in a game of football. I'm sad to say South View did not come out on top of the game but were very gracious losers.

Each afternoon the students received a lesson to learn about the Cambodian language, the culture and their history, where they amazing me in the questions they asked and how respectful they were. They got to visit the local community temple and get blessed by the monks.

Students then travelled to Siem Reap where they visited the Beng Mealea Temple and Angkor Wat. After some shopping at the local markets we headed of to the Cambodian Phare Circus for an evening of entertainment.

We then spent a day travelling to Phnom Penh where students visited the genocide museum S21 and the killing fields Choeung Ek. We were privileged to get to meet and speak with 4 of the 12 survivors form S21.

The week was an huge success and the students I hope had an amazing time. We hope to continue of journey with Camps international over the coming years.
